I think about the many people Tim and I, and our family, have connected with over the years and it amazes me. Now, we have Banyan youth that know nothing other than Banyan in their lives, second generation Banyan kids, and community members on staff. Transformation within the life of a person is evident as we grow from infancy to adult, as well the transformation of Banyan within the lives of community members as we grow from our teen years into adulthood.

Banyan's transformation during 2013-2014 includes learning from our past and advancing our future with: the purchase of land and the development of a capital campaign, growing our leadership with our community council, skilled staff, and board, as well as fine tuning our vision by updating our strategic plan. We are becoming adults and learning what it means to be leaders by telling our story and living strong; demonstrating the outcomes of the Banyan by being leading citizens, reconciled people, committed learners, and future oriented.

Banyan is a Christian Community Development organization based on community design models honed from years of lived experience imbedded in community



relationships, innovation and application of current research and best practices, with a 15-year success rate that is proven to develop youth, strengthen families, and create community in our urban neighborhood. \$1 MILLION DOLLARS INVESTED IN EDUCATION

What started when co-founder Joan Essenburg dreamt of access to a college preparatory school neighborhood youth - has become the beacon of our youth programming has reached the million dollar milestone this year!

In the late 90's there were a large number of youth 'hanging around' the neighborhood during the school day. Joani, a licensed teacher, knew that giving youth and their families an opportunity to receive a 'high quality' education could change the trajectory of their futures, and then the fabric of the community.

Funding was a major barrier for families in the Phillips neighborhood, until Ed and Toni Egan answered the call to make this new pathway a reality. They provided the first scholarship and went on to share the Banyan story with friends and colleagues to line up

more individuals to invest in urban youth, one at a time, each making a four-year commitment.

In 2014 we celebrated the graduation of the 25th Banyan scholarship recipient as a part of the program that has been delivering 100% graduation rates, in a neighborhood that averages ~35%. There are 27 recipients of the scholarship in the 2014-2015 school year! Banyan is growing and supporters continue to make this important investment in education, thanks to the groundwork laid by Ed and Toni Egan, a wonderful legacy is transforming our community!

NEIGHBORHOOD STATS

There are 1,500 families in East and Midtown Phillips. In our neighborhood 51% of all children live in poverty. The City of Minneapolis four-year high school graduation rate is 47% and drops to 36% for African American youth and 34% for Latino youth. The median family income is \$34,000. The unemployment rate is 15% and the poverty rate is 41%.



COMMUNITY

Banyan connects members of the neighborhood with each other, creating bonds that encourage communication and belonging. Building trust between residents, and training leaders on every block, brings hope and safety to every home. Banyan acts as a "resource hub," connecting residents with supportive systems and equipping them as Leading Citizens.

COMMUNITY CONNECTING PROGRAMS:

DEEPENING ROOTS

Growing Responsibly is something Banyan lives out every day. The discussion of growth for Banyan began over four years ago during a strategic planning meeting precipitated by a waiting list which has now reached over 100 youth.

In January of 2013 at a public hearing, the Minneapolis Park Board voted unanimously to allow Banyan to purchase a one-acre parcel near our current location. Banyan cleared the project through Minneapolis Zoning in 2014. Having passed those two hurdles we are positioned to break ground for the new community center in the fall of 2015 with occupancy in the summer of 2016.

The final hurdle is funding. We are on track to secure \$2.29 million dollars of our \$3 million dollar goal to break ground late 2015. The total project is \$5 million. Lead funders to date include Richard M. Schulze Foundation, Otto Bremer Foundation, Rose Francis Foundation, General Mills Foundation, March Family Foundation, Marbrook Foundation, and many more.

Banyan needs capital gifts of all sizes to fill the gap, maintain the momentum, and achieve success. In a recent strategic planning meeting with Community Council members, they renamed themselves "The Dreambuilders." Join us, be a dreambuilder and share the Banyan story and our vision for transformation in the Phillips neighborhood.

On a sunny July day, business leaders came together for an inspirational morning to network and discuss the future of urban America.




